

Early Years Foundation Stage



The children in Nursery and Reception follow the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum which covers the learning and development of voung children.

The main aim of the Early Years Foundation Stage is to provide a firm foundation in learning for now and for the future. This builds on children's skills, attitudes and knowledge in seven areas of learning: Personal, Social and Emotional Development, Physical Development, Communication and Language, Mathematics, Literacy, Understanding the World and Expressive Arts and Design.

In the Early Years children learn and develop in different ways through a variety of meaningful and challenging play opportunities.

We look, listen and note where each child is on their developmental pathway and constantly plan for their next steps in learning. We provide a rich and exciting learning environment both inside and outside the classroom, ensuring that all experience will build on children's knowledge and challenge their learning.



We aim to build a strong partnership with parents through home visits and keyworker/parent conversations as we know this enhances a child's learning and development.

Curriculum

English



English work is based on the National Curriculum which develops the areas

of reading, writing and grammar, punctuation and spelling (GPS) plus speaking and listening. Literacy skills are of paramount importance in the school.

The main aim of language development is to create an excellent means of communication. both written and verbal, which can be used confidently and successfully in all aspects of life. In addition to covering a wide variety of writing genres in focussed English lessons, children receive daily handwriting sessions, which allow them to refine cursive, joined handwriting.

In Reception and Key Stage 1 children receive a 30 minute daily phonics session, following the Read Write Inc (RWI) programme. Children then progress onto the RWI spelling and comprehension programme which embeds the phonic skills taught whilst allowing the children to use their knowledge of sounds for spelling and reading unfamiliar vocabulary. Throughout all year groups, we use a reading scheme to support children in becoming successful and confident readers. Children are also taught core reading skills in comprehension lessons to develop their understanding of a text as well as engaging with high quality texts across the curriculum.

Mathematics



The teaching of mathematics at Beanfield seeks to develop a deep

understanding, confidence and competence - shaping assured, happy and resilient mathematicians who relish the challenge of maths. We teach following a mastery approach whereby children are encouraged to use and explore practical approaches in lessons that cement their understanding of key mathematical concepts. The curriculum aims to aive children daily opportunities to reason and problem solve, which further helps them to become independent. reflective thinkers whose skills not only liberate them in maths but also support them across the curriculum.

Science



Science is taught across the whole school and involves using scientific enquiry

skills across a range of units such as living things, physical processes and materials and their properties.

This enables children to build up their knowledge and understanding in each area which progresses and deepens as they move through the school. Children will experience science practically, linked to present day events and influential scientists past and present. Children are able to use a range of scientific equipment and take the lead in investigating, experimenting and exploring their own questions.





Art & Design

Our aim is to give every child the opportunity to be curious, observant, creative and reflective through art. We teach them the skills to allow them to explore and express their own art ideas.

This process is usually linked to topic work and is recorded in sketchbooks. Work is undertaken in drawing, painting, mixed media, 3D sculpture, textiles, clay and printing.



Computing

The school has a strong infrastructure to deliver the computing curriculum including computers in every

classroom, a computer suite, laptop trollevs and LearnPad tablets. We follow the Purple Mash scheme of work which offers opportunities for children to:

- Understand the basic principles and concepts of computer science
- Practise creating and writing computer programs, solving problems as they arise
- Evaluate and apply information technology to solve problems
- Be responsible, competent, confident and creative users of information technology

Children are encouraged to use these skills and apply them to other areas of their learning. In addition, children are taught how to keep safe online which is enhanced by everyone taking part in Internet Safety Day each year.

Design & Technology

In their design technology projects children are encouraged to work with artefacts, systems and environments.

They learn how to use tools safely and design and make things in a variety of media and for different purposes. During each Key Stage the children will work on the following processes: designing, making, evaluating and technical knowledge. They will also look at aspects of cooking and nutrition.

Geography



To develop their interest in the subject the children study physical geography, human geography and the

environment. They develop skills in map reading, collection of data and measurement. They are encouraged, where possible, to make first hand observations and to look critically at sources of information.

History



To encourage the children to develop an interest in history and awareness of the past, they learn about all aspects of

life in different periods, ranging from The Stone Age to The Vikings as well as undertaking a local history study. They are expected to use various sources of information as they learn to describe and explain historical change and cause.

Modern Foreign Languages



Modern foreign languages are introduced to the children from Early Years through our language of the

term programme. Each term there is a whole school focus on Spanish, French or German where children learn key phrases in the focus language and key facts about the country.

As they enter Key Stage 2, children start to learn the school's chosen language in discrete weekly lessons which continue all the way through to the end of Year 6. During these lessons, the children are taught themed vocabulary which can then be applied to activities aimed at developing their reading, writing, speaking and listening skills.

Music




The school endeavours to introduce all children to a wide range of musical activities as part of the curriculum.

Activities include composing, performing and appraising alongside developing children's musical vocabulary. Children are given the opportunity to learn to play the recorder, use a wide range of percussion and tuned instruments as well as singing, to develop a wider knowledge of music and its cultural influences.

The school has a Glee ensemble, which performs for parents and takes part in local community events and competitions, as well as some other music and arts-based extra-curricular activities and singing assemblies. Additionally, children can take part in individual music tuition, taught by peripatetic teachers in school by a separate 'fee paying' arrangement with the Northamptonshire Music and Performing Arts Trust.

Physical Education (PE)



All children have access to at least two hours of physical education per week. The school follows the PE hub scheme

which allows children access to a wide range of physical activities appropriate to their age, abilities and interests including athletics, dance, games, gymnastics and swimming. The school promotes healthy competition through a range of in school competitions, events and activities and children also have opportunities to represent the school in many local sporting competitions.

PSHCE (Personal Social Health and Citizenship Education)



The school follows the Jigsaw PSHCE scheme which is a comprehensive scheme of learning for PSHCE

Education including emotional literacy, social skills and spiritual development. This is taught in lessons in which children focus on a particular theme over the course of a half term.

These themes include Being Me in My World, Celebrating Differences, Relationships, Healthy Me and Changes (which supports the government's compulsory Relationship and Sex Education). All of these themes allow the children to think in a more in-depth way about how they react in different situations and how they can overcome obstacles.

Religious Education



In Key Stage 1, children learn about festivals and places of worship in Christianity and at least two other world

faiths. They study stories from religious traditions, signs and symbols, artefacts and music.



Throughout Key Stage 2, the children continue to learn about festivals and various other religions and they also study sacred writings and pilgrimages. There are opportunities for the children to visit different places of worship throughout their time at Beanfield. Christian ideas

and attitudes enter most areas of school life and assemblies take place throughout the year which focus on a range of themes. Parents who wish to withdraw their children from any areas of the RE work or acts of collective worship should contact the school.

Behaviour



As a school we believe that there should be mutual respect between all members of our community.

Adults should be role models for

good behaviour and children should know and understand the consequences if their behaviour falls below the standard that we expect.

Through our House Team and Positive Behaviour programme we ensure that children have opportunities to be rewarded for positive behaviour and to set an example to others as role models throughout the school.

Extended Provision



The Extended Provision is committed to providing a safe and nurturing environment before and after school each

day. It opens at 7am and closes at 6pm daily during term time and school holidays. A range of exciting and relaxing activities are on offer for the children.

The provision provides busy parents with more flexibility during the school day and they can be confident that their children are safe and well cared for.

Special Educational Needs



A great deal of care is taken to ensure that each child develops his/ her potential and any learning or behavioural difficulties are supported

through a range of strategies and intervention sessions. Extra help is given both in and outside the classroom, in the short term and long term, as the need arises. If more expertise is required, then parents are informed and with their permission we will seek the involvement of outside agencies. Our procedure of identifying, assessing and meeting Special Educational Needs is fully explained on our website.





Specialist Provision

The Unit is our Specialist Provision which caters for children aged 4-11 whose Educational Health Care Plan (EHCP) identifies severe learning difficulties including Autism. It offers discrete provision and inclusion into the mainstream school as appropriate.

The Unit is an integral part of Beanfield Primary School. Classes are based on individual needs and academic abilities. Within the Unit our children receive a themed curriculum which all subjects are taught under.

A therapeutic and sensory curriculum is underpinned throughout. We value skills for life; communication, thinking, self-help and leisure. We help children to develop these skills at the level that is appropriate to them. Wherever possible we encourage and

support children into inclusion sessions within mainstream classes.

The individual needs and learning styles of students will determine the methodologies used. This may include 1:1 and small group learning; integrated individual programmes of work as suggested by therapists and other professionals; signing and teaching in small steps; the use of Alternative Augmented Communication (AAC) and

structured teaching using the TEACH approach. Within our provision we have a soft play room, sensory light room and our own outdoor area.

Each student has a teacher who co-ordinates their pastoral and curricular needs and ensures the EHCP targets are implemented, monitored and reviewed.

We have close links with therapists including physiotherapists, occupational therapists, speech and language therapists as well as other specialists who hold regular clinics within our provision.

Admissions



Admissions for children into the Specialist Provision must have a relevant EHCP, meeting our criteria of need. To apply for a place you must contact the EHC Team at Northamptonshire County Council.

Dedicated tours for the Specialist Provision are available on request.

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Engagement



Attendance



Absences will only be authorised when medical evidence is provided – this could be a medical prescription; appointment card; doctor's note; or hospital letter. Exceptional circumstances such as family bereavement

Absence will not generally be authorised for any other reason. We ask that where possible, medical or dental appointments are taken out of school time.

If you know that your child is going to be absent, please contact school in advance to complete an absence form. In line with local authority auidelines, leave during term time will be referred to the Education Inclusion Partnership Team where consideration will be given to issuing a penalty notice.
