

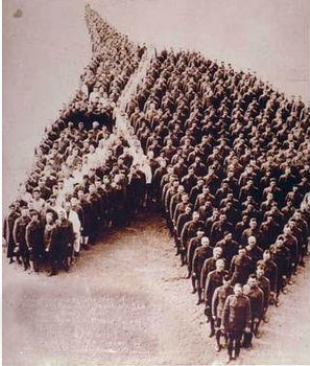

## IN FLANDERS FIELDS

We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
